Rotorua Branch 2017 -2018

Rotorua Branch held its AGM for the 2016-17 year in May and we can report that the branch is in good heart. All sitting committee members were re-elected and we also welcome Tania Heasman to the committee. Jim Rofe is standing down from his role as Treasurer and we give him grateful thanks for all his efforts on the financial front over many years. Jim will continue to manage the Violet Bonnington Reserve and the Treasurer position has been taken by Tania (thank you Tania). We thank all those people, both members and nonmembers, who have contributed to branch activities in any way. A special thank you to the Committee who have worked hard and accomplished much.

Financial Report: Financially the branch is doing well. The financial year ended on 28th February and the Branch had a comfortable surplus after meeting all expenses. Our main source of income is interest derived from Violet Bonnington's bequest and our Bank term deposits, and our main expenses were producing and posting our newsletter, Tikitapu and Violet Bonnington Reserve costs and supporting KCC.

Pest Fest: In April, in conjunction with DOC and BoPRC, Mike and Sandra Goodwin organised and ran a pest control display and workshop at the Blue Lake Top 10 Holiday Park. Attendees were able to see, discuss and manipulate a range of pest control devices and systems. This was a popular event with many people taking away information on how to kill their particular problem pests

Reports

Violet Bonnington Reserve (VBR)

The VBR, under the able care of Manager Jim Rofe, provides access to the Mt Ngongotaha Bush and is well used by the public. The Nature Walk in the bush has become a very popular short excursion and the Jubilee Track provides a longer walk up the mountain. Following the wet summer and the recent storms some track maintenance in the VBR has been required. We are pleased with the growth of the trees (planting began in 2007) that are transforming this bare pasture into bush.

Tikitapu Care Group (Manager – Frankie Blakely)

Working bees to check and clear the bait lines commenced again in May and a good start was made in preparation for the actual pest control. Also, over the past few months some of our volunteers have been busy removing the base plates from the bait stations, adapting them with a baffle to keep the possums out, and then taking them back and replacing them in the bait stations. This is a result of research carried out by



Dave Edwards (Otanewainuku Kiwi Trust) trialling various adaptations to the base plates and we are grateful to him for sharing his findings and for his advice. It will be interesting to see what results are achieved if we succeed in reducing the rat population without interference from possums.

Monthly checks have been done on the Nature and Mistletoe tracks and any trimming or clearance of windfalls attended to. The Good Nature traps have also been checked monthly and any kills found, or counter strikes then recorded. There has been little activity reported which hopefully will mean the monitoring in July will also show less activity than in previous years.

This project is dependent on volunteers and I wish to thank all those who have been involved over the past months. It is always good to have some new people involved in the project and new volunteers are most welcome. Working bees start at 9am and normally finish by 12noon at the latest. There is a "cuppa" and something to eat when you get back to

base. I would love to hear from you if you are interested in becoming involved with this project. Working bee dates are included in the programme of events for the year.

Documentary film and talk – Monday 6 August

"On the Shoulders of Giants" Catherine Kirby - Waikato Tree Project and Andrew (tree climber)

In 1978 conservation activists occupied Pureora Forest to try and stop the felling of native trees. They built platforms in the trees, sat on the ground in front of the trees and on the tracks, and hid under logs. This documentary captures the amazing natural and human history of Pureora Forest. It is a story of forest discovery, degradation and then protection. Catherine and Andrew will give their perspective on the historic events and the outcome.

New Zealand's Zero Carbon Bill – Public Consultation

In 2015 NZ signed the Paris Agreement which set a world target of net zero emissions by the second half of this century. NZ needs to set goals to achieve this - and to plan transition towards them. A Zero Carbon Act will put us on the path to action by creating carbon budgets that keep us on track to reduce emissions. Our two big polluters are agriculture and transport. Key elements are:

- renewable energy
- afforestation
- using new technologies
- electric vehicles and public transport

Three different options are being considered and the first part of the consultation is to choose which path to pursue. These are:

- 1. Net Zero Carbon Dioxide 2050
- 2. Net Zero Long lived and stabilised short lived gases (nitrous oxide and methane)
- 3. Net Zero all greenhouse gases

Public submissions on the this first step – the content of the Bill - are due by the 19th July. Get involved in the Ministry for the Environment's Zero Carbon consultation by making a submission. You are invited to have your say online through the following sites

New Forest & Bird campaign "Forgotten Places".
