

Wednesday 10 Molesworth Simon Moore

Vegetation monitoring on Molesworth dates back to 1944 when Lucy Moore established early photo points. Since then, many attempts have been made to look at change over time on Molesworth using a variety of methods and motivated by a range of purposes. Within the last 30 years focus has come on the effects of cattle grazing on indigenous vegetation. Simon will provide an overview of the most recent results and talk about longer-term trends, as well as discussing some of the inherent difficulties in monitoring over such a vast landscape.

Wednesday 8 AGM & The King Shag



The King Shag is one of six species of blue-eyed shags which breed in New Zealand. All have relatively small populations and are classified as either "vulnerable" or "critically endangered".

JUNE

Wednesday 12 Sea Birds

'Flying into an uncertain future' a presentation by David Melville. David has, for most of his life, worked to ensure the needs of waders and other coastal bird, both migratory and local, are adequately looked after by councils and governments in their decision making. In recent years David has worked with Chinese authorities to stop in-filling of shorelines in the Yellow Sea where thousands of migratory birds feed on their flights to Alaska and Siberia where they breed.



Regional Manager's Roving Report

Happy 2019 everyone and what a hot one to start the year off. It reminds us all that the effects of climate change and increasing heatwaves are increasingly felt. I've spent the summer closely watching our bat survey work, and had the fortune to hold one in my hand for the first time in late January - what an amazing moment that was. But with the warmer days, it's really important that we remember that wildlife and plants will be suffering the effects of long hot days, dry winds, and no rain! Where you can, please make water available (away from cats), and keep your eyes out for stressed animals. I'm kicking this year off with a very busy schedule of meetings around the development of the New Zealand Biodiversity Strategy, and have been buoyed by the interest shown by local people - with 60 turning up to a meeting in Richmond on the 25th January. You can contribute to this very important

conversation at https://www.doc.govt.nz/get-involved/have-your-say/all-consultations/2018/new-zealand-biodiversity-strategy/ with submissions closing at the end of February. At this stage it is a very broad scoping exercise, so your big picture thinking is appreciated, as well as your intimate knowledge of local issues.

The Board have recently approved our Operational Plan for 2019, and over the next while you'll see activity from zero-bycatch marine campaigns, through to support for the 1080 work in the beech mast year, and engagement with the no new mines on public conservation land campaign. Keep your eyes peeled, and your pen poised for opportunities to get involved and give nature the voice it deserves.

Forest and Bird 2019 Native Plantings

Riparian Pioneer planting along the Whakapuaka river at Paremata Flats Reserve will continue this year, Forest and Bird (F&B) in conjunction with Nelson City Council have around 6000 pioneer plants to get in

the ground along with around 600 canopy trees provided by F&B to be placed within existing pioneer plantings.

Further to F&B planting programme this year we are working with the American owners of a unique property at Appleby where we plan to assist them in getting in around 1800 plants, further details on this project closer to the time.
