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# Habitat - North Shore Branch news

### Bar-tailed godwits, and the shell barrier beaches of Ngataringa and Shoal Bays




In September every year between 200-300 bar-tailed godwits descend on the shell banks in Ngataringa and Shoal Bays on the inner Waitemata Harbour, to rest and feed after their 8 to 9-day, 11,000 km nonstop flight from Alaska. Other smaller and larger groups of godwits find their way to estuaries all around New Zealand to spend the summer months feeding up before returning to Alaska to breed.

How they came to find the shell banks in Ngataringa Bay is not known, but we do know why they choose them.

These shell banks – technically known as chenier barrier banks – are globally rare; the largest in New Zealand is at Miranda and it is the only chenier bank in the world that is still increasing is size. The

banks occur in tidal zones where shellfish are prolific, and are formed when a storm surge radically disturbs the seabed, uplifting shellfish from their bed of sediment and depositing them on the shore. Over time and with many storm surges, a high bank of shells forms.

These banks provide seabirds such as godwits, dotterel and oystercatchers with both a place to roost, and access to a fertile feeding ground.



But their existence is threatened by human development. Water quality deterioration and sediment runoff caused by urban growth pose a threat both to the shell banks and to the birds' feeding grounds. People also pose other threats to the banks and the birds.

Godwits congregate in flocks on the shell beaches, and they can be extremely wary birds, flying away on approach. Disturbance interrupts their resting, and given that they have lost almost half their body weight on the flight to New Zealand, rest – after eating - is necessary for them to regain their fitness. In order to survive the flight back to Alaska via China for breeding, the godwits spend their days eating until up to 55% of their body weight is fat, and then reduce the size of their gut, kidney and liver by up to 25 per cent to compensate.



On the Ngataringa and Shoal Bay shell beaches, disturbance is often caused by walkers – locals who are enjoying the coastal area, or walking their dogs, and others who come specially to see the godwits and other birds. At critical times - when resident local birds like variable oystercatchers are nesting, or migratory birds like the godwits have just arrived or are preparing for long distance flight to their

breeding grounds - people cause disturbance both to the delicate structure of the shell beaches and to the daily life of the birds.

**NOTE**: Shell banks in Shoal and Ngataringa estuaries are designated by Auckland Council as Significant Ecological Area (SEA) Marine 1 sites, although one at Ngataringa Bay was missed off the Unitary Plan. We have assurances that this will be added at some stage.


### Monday 1 April 2019 7:30pm – Our brief AGM

### Sally Richardson - Tawharanui

Tawharanui Regional Park is New Zealand's first integrated open sanctuary, combining farming, public recreation and conservation of native species.

### Monday 6 May 2019 7:30pm Katrina Goddard, Marine Conservation Advocate, Forest & Bird

Our precious Hauraki Gulf/Tikapa Moana/Te Moana Nui a Toi is in trouble. Over two lifetimes, the health of these waters has been severely degraded by overfishing, bottom trawling, pollution and climate change. <u>Sea Change/Tai Timu Tai Pari</u> is a plan that could reverse this damage and rebuild the health and mauri of the gulf; it is the product of many voices, including mana whenua, commercial and recreational fishing, aquaculture, communities, scientists, and conservationists. Forest & Bird's marine advocate Katrina Goddard was on the plan's working group.

## **Tuff Crater**



The Tuff Crater Restoration Project on the North Shore commenced in 2000 with the planting of the Millennium Forest and has continued with major pest plant control, planting and predator control ever since. A major part of the work involves finding and removing threats from noxious alien invaders such as moth plant and wild ginger. It also includes releasing of new native plants so they do not get smothered by growth such as kikuyu grass or morning glory. Planting occurs in the winter months and the more energetic may get involved in path and drain maintenance.

No previous experience is required. If you do not know your plants, you will be guided by, and learn from, other team members..


