What can we do with weeds?

Of course, the question is facetious. If there were a use for these plants they would not be "weeds".

The definition of "weed" runs from harmful to the seriously invasive. Auckland's benign climate encourages many weeds to flourish here, and has led it be called 'the weed capital of the world'.

Such natural green spaces as still exist in the Auckland urban area are constantly under threat from weeds of all kinds. Some, such as moth plant (Araujia sericifera) are so successful that unless outbreaks are kept under control, they will smother regenerating bush.

Council's contractors working in high value general reserves are required to control many of the more noxious weeds. However, volunteer groups play a major role in keeping these weeds from spreading out of control in significant ecological areas (SEA's). The effectiveness of their work is being increasingly hampered by the spread of weeds across private property. There is currently no compulsion on private landowners to control a wide range of invasive environmental weeds.

Auckland Council has recently revised the Regional Pest Management Plan (RPMP) 2019-2029 making private landowners in the vicinity of some high value parks and reserves responsible for weed control on their property. With legally enforceable responsibilities, the work of the volunteers should be reduced in *selected high value reserves*. But this does not cover many of the areas bounding SEA's.

Many Forest and Bird members from the Tuff Crater team and others spend a significant amount of time on weed control activities. One of these volunteers, Keith Salmon says: "Without some constraints on property occupiers and in particular on

absentee landlords over the Auckland region, I anticipate that moth plant, etc will spread explosively over the next 10 years - making the control efforts in high value reserves and their buffer zones a Sisyphean task."

On behalf of Le Roys Bush & Little Shoal Bay Reserves Charitable Trust, Keith has lodged an appeal against the RPMP. Another group of volunteers led by the John La Roche of Eastern Song Bird has lodged a similar appeal.

Keith asks: If any other people across Auckland are interested in getting together to create a more effective combined representative group to address weed control, we would be pleased to work with you.

Specifically we are looking for:


A fundraiser - someone keen to help out putting in funding applications to further the goals of our branch.
