Wednesday 12th 'Tasman Bay Guardians' . Stew Robertson Stew Robertson is founder and director of Abel Tasman Eco Tours and Tasman Bay Guardians. He spends his days out on the water in Tasman Bay, observing the natural world through an ecological lense and communicating that to his clients. In recent years, his work has led him to found Tasman Bay Guardians, leading a dedicated team of professionals delivering marine and freshwater experiential education, co-ordinating clean up events, reef restoration projects and native plantings. Stew is involved in the regional and national biodiversity strategies and has pushed for the implementation of an integrated marine spatial plan for Te Tai o Aorere Tasman and Golden Bays. Stew will be giving a fascinating visual overview of the current ecological state of Tasman Bay,

potential solutions and how we can work together to achieve these. This work comes from peer reviewed science, firsthand experience and a growing knowledge of the needs of our eco-systems and communities. And of course many of you were at the large Ministry for the Environment hosted meeting about Te Mana o te Wai - the Action Plan for Freshwater (as well as urban development, product stewardship - and other important environment issues. It is imperative that Forest & Bird's voices are heard on these matters - to make sure that a vocal minority aren't impeding progress. So please keep up your engagement - it is noted, and appreciated!

I look forward to seeing some of you at the South Island gathering in a month's time, and in the meantime we are seeing the rolling vanguard of action on climate change across the world. Please support local events, on the 27th September. This crisis is one that will have a huge impact on biodiversity, and we need to ensure ongoing action.

Don't forget to vote in our local body elections, Councils have such a large influence over how terrestrial, freshwater and marine biodiversity and natural features are protected and managed. Ask them the hard questions before you tick your box!

Antoni Manning is the 2019 winner of the F & B Andy Dennis Memorial Scholarship. We hope he will attend our October Meeting.

The scholarship supports a student, who would benefit from financial support, studying at NMIT for the NZ Certificate in Conservation. The scholarship is designed to assist students for one year of academic study.

The Nelson Tasman Branch of Forest & Bird has advocated for nearly 100 years for the health of our freshwater systems.

We have sought protection of the instream values of our rivers, streams and freshwater wetlands. We have advocated for, and actively created and restored, native riparian vegetation. Riparian vegetation provides water cooling, creates habitat and improves water clarity as well as providing food sources for not only fish and other in stream organisms but also birds and insects that live in riverine and wetland areas.

The Government has recently released its proposed policies on fresh water.
