The Sanctuary Ecan Wetland Reserve Coutts Island Road, Waimakiriri River.

The North Canterbury Branch of Forest and Bird has a working relationship with Environment Canterbury (ECan) to undertake Predator Control and to undertake two planting days at the Sanctuary, a 30 hectare ECan Wetland Reserve situated within the stop bank and Waimakiriri River adjacent to 590 Coutts Island Road. In the 2024 planting season, two planting days were held.

- On Saturday the 13th July, 26 adults and 5 children (members, friends and ECan staff) planted 558 plants adjacent to the gate on the main stop bank, followed by a bbq put on by ECan.
- On Saturday the 17th August, 20 helpers planted 505 plants adjacent to the main access track just before the turn off into the 360 walking track that passes through the central area of the Sanctuary. A total of 1063 plants in the ground.

The two planting days accounted for 160 volunteer hours.

The Predator control has had similar numbers of kills as the last two years. The area has some streams and springs as natural features but is unfenced so we get possums migrating from the adjoining farmland and river margins to the west and east. Extra traps were added for the 2024 year at Lorimas Road plantings and near Bailes picnic car park. The traps were generally checked fortnightly. The tallies for 2024 were (in brackets 2023 numbers): Possums 63 (53), Rats 99 (100), Weasels 12 (15), Stoats 2 (1), Hedgehogs 22 (23), Mice (bycatch) 18 (32), Blackbird 1 and feral cat 1 (1). A total of 218 pests removed from the environment. We had two extra volunteers for most of the year which allowed for track maintenance and plant maintenance during the year. A total of 300 volunteer hours were involved with the trapping, track maintenance and release weeding.

The 2025 planting days have been confirmed with ECan and these are on Saturday the 14th June and Saturday the 19th July, with a bbq being provided by ECan. These will be on the ECan website as Forest and Bird planting days. Put these dates in your calendar now and help restore the diversity of the Reserve.

Calder-Green Reserve

Calder Green Reserve site is doing well with various reeds growing on the mudflats and saltmarsh ribbonwoods mostly along the river-bank edge.

- **Predator Control:** The Christchurch City Council coastal team have now integrated predator control within the Ferrymead Regional Park, which was initially done by Avon-Heathcote Estuary/Ihutai Trust. The predator trapping area is along the tidal zone of the Ōpāwaho/ Heathcote River to the Tunnel Road. This includes around the Calder-Green Reserve and Lizard Sanctuary area.
- Working with Christchurch City Council / Ferrymead Regional Park: About 600 plants were planted in 2024, mostly various sedges, tussocks and Coprosma *spp*. A further 600 plants are planned for 2025 planting.

The CCC Ferrymead Regional Park team has removed most of the pines (some large trees, mostly gums were left for roosting purposes) and planted 12,000 plants to revegetate this area. See areas highlighted in image above. Very pleasing to see the CCC Ferrymead Regional Park team being funded for this area of the Heathcote/Ōpāwaho River.

The 2024/25 summer has been very good for the F&B as well as the CCC plantings, which are growing well.

• Sea Lavender: A 'search and destroy' blitz was done again in February 2025 along with a large team from the Council. The true right (the side of F&B Reserve) is looking great, with no plants found on the islands and only 13 in total along that stretch. On the true left however, we found about 740 plants, mainly along the Settlers Crescent strip, where we haven't found all that much before. The historic areas that we have been covering for years are looking positive but we keep finding new areas we need to stay on top of. Further on going monitoring and control work will be done next summer too.

Mahoe-nui Restoration Project



Mahoe-nui is a lovely gully of remnant native bush behind Sumner. It is on CCC land and has been fenced off from surrounding farmland since 2006. It is situated from Evans Pass road (near Rapanui bush), to above the summit road. Forest and Bird with the Sumner Environment group provide volunteers to help restore the bush under the guidance of dedicated Port Hills rangers Di Carter and Fiona Fenton.

We have two planting days in winter and two releasing days in spring and again in autumn, when the long grass that surrounds the young plants is cut back and used to mulch the plants. We plant 600 trees each year and it is lovely to see the valley filling up with native bush. We have had a good survival rate of plants due to a careful planting regime, and some summer rain this year.

The working bees are only 2 hours long and there is a cuppa and some baking to enjoy afterwards. New people are always very welcome. Total volunteer hours for the year were 236. A big thank you to all our volunteers who make this project happen, especially 'the regulars' who love this site as much as I do.

Lewis Pass – Boyle Base Trapping Project

The Boyle Base trapping Project is located in the Lewis Pass area near the Boyle village. We have about 140 traps in 3 circuits to catch rats and mustelids (stoats and weasels) to protect native wildlife in the valley. It takes about 2 days for volunteers to get around the traps which are cleared and re-baited monthly.

The trapping management team is Helen Hills, Bruce Craig, Phill McEntee, Geoff Mahan and Rick Robinson. Numbers of predators caught (Oct 23 - Oct 24) were 32 stoats, 23 weasels, 92 rats and 13 hedgehogs. About 4 years ago, a DOC Community Fund grant enabled us to replace 60 of our Fenn traps with DOC 200s. In 2023, we gratefully received a \$4000 grant from the McFarlane Trust which has enabled us to replace most of the remaining Fenn traps with DOC 200s. Thank you to Bruce, Phill, Rick and Geoff who made the boxes and bait cages. These are now installed in the field.

We are one of several groups trapping in the Lewis Pass area, together called the Lewis Trapping Alliance to share knowledge and generally help each other out.

Boyle base Hut has been well used, especially by The Doubtless Trapping Trust who have installed trap lines up the Doubtful valley and beyond. Boyle Base was also booked by many other individuals and families who enjoy using the hut as a base to explore the beautiful Lewis Pass area.

Thank you to Di Cowan and Dave Evans who do our bird counts in spring and autumn. Bird numbers seem similar to previous years. These are bellbird/koromako, rifleman/tītipounamu, grey warbler/riroriro, tomtit/ngirungiru, robin/toutouwai, silver eye/tauhou, brown creeper/pīpipi and occasionally kākāriki, falcon/kārearea, and tūī.

Small numbers of Caspian terns and dotterels nest on the Boyle river bed near the confluence of the Lewis and Boyle rivers. To help protect these, we have applied to DoC for permission to trap feral cats which have been sighted long the river bed and around the hut.

Thank you to the volunteers who have helped with trapping and hut/lawn maintenance/firewood collecting. Volunteer hours were approximately 475. We are a small team and any new volunteers are welcome.

Thanks to Bruce Craig who has sourced some firewood for the hut from a farm forester friend. So important for keeping the hut cosy in the winter.

Stocker Scholarships
