Talk: The Battle for the Plateau: Forest & Bird's Campaign to Save Denniston Speaker: Scott Burnett, Top of the South F&B Regional Conservation Manager



Denniston Plateau is an iconic 'lost world', a biodiversity hotspot rated by DOC as one of the most ecologically valuable sites on the mainland, is facing an imminent threat. Bathurst Resources is proposing a massive 25-year opencast coal mine, planning to use the government's controversial Fast-Track legislation to push it through with minimal public oversight. The scale of

the proposed destruction is immense, threatening to permanently obliterate unique sandstone ecosystems, ancient dwarf forests, and habitats for rare species like the great spotted kiwi and the endemic Avatar moth.

Scott Burnett is "Save Denniston campaign" lead for Forest & Bird and will explain the full context of the mining proposal and the dangers of the Fast-Track law.

The talk will start streaming at 7.30 p.m.

a powerhouse of global documentary filmmaking.

Born in Dunedin's TVNZ studios in the 1970s, Natural History New Zealand - known globally as NHNZ- developed from a government-run unit to an Emmy Award-winning international producer, reflecting not only the growth of an industry, but the evolution of New Zealand's place in global media and the emergence of a strong conservation movement.



Talk: Reasons to kill rats"

Speakers: Professor Steve Trewick & Professor Mary Morgan Richards



Three species of rat arrived in Aotearoa with humans and quickly spread to all corners. At the same time as rats expanded, many endemic vertebrate populations went extinct. The invasive rodents compete with native predators, harbour fleas with disease and add to our carbon footprint. We talk about the ecology of rats in New Zealand forests and summarise why we kill them and who benefits from reducing their density. We are also interested in rat dispersal and their ability to tolerate high doses of anticoagulants and will talk about future studies.
